Worship Announcement

All throughout the pandemic, your leadership team and I have taken great care to follow the guidelines by the CDC, the MN Department of Health, and the Minnesota Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. We also have a comprehensive and contextualized plan to consult that was created by some of our own members for our congregation.

After much discernment and research, our Chancel Choir Director, Paolo Debuque, and I prepared a proposal for Church Council to consider regarding our current pandemic protocols. After careful consideration, the Church Council affirmed the following proposed changes:

- Effective the first Sunday of March, the Chancel Choir may begin singing again live during Sunday morning in-person worship. The congregation will continue to wear face masks inside the building for now (cloth or surgical masks are fine), and as an additional safety precaution, the choir will wear N95 or KN95 masks.
- Hymnals will return to the pews and the congregation will be encouraged to sing hymns instead of humming along with the melody.



These changes have been much anticipated, and we're excited for them to arrive. Come and join us for in-person worship March 6 as we celebrate the Chancel Choir's return. It's also the first Sunday of Lent, and we'll receive communion. All are welcome at Good Samaritan UMC, and I hope to see you soon.

Through our Facebook page and website, our worship services and content are viewed hundreds of times each week. Beyond our immediate area, our worship is viewed in places like greater Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Colorado, Massachusetts, Florida, California, Illinois, and we even have regular viewers in the Philippines! An elder member of our community living in Spokane, WA, has reconnected to our church through online worship. Many Sundays, her daughter comes to her home, and they worship together with us.

We're seeing people signing up for discussion groups who've found us online and are new to our church. We have members of the LGBTQ community who live in places where they don't have access to an accepting congregation, who find us to be a safe and sacred space. We have people watching who aren't physically able to get out. Sometimes they watch worship more than once. People with busy schedules are choosing the option to worship when it works for them. Still others supplement their church going elsewhere by viewing our services.

Our dedicated, produced worship services offer a more personal and reflective experience than livestreamed worship services, where the online viewer is often more of an afterthought, and production values are often quite low. While our online service is an important offering, we're also mindful that church is about more than weekly worship. In upcoming newsletters, I'll talk about how and why our online second service is different from in-person worship, and things we're working on to expand our ability to connect in the online realm.

It is a great honor do this work with all of you as we continue taking bold steps into the future of 21st Century church, in our ongoing mission to seek out and build new spaces: to do all the good we can, in all the places, times, means, and ways we can - for as long as we can.





many of them unacknowledged, using comparisons with India and Nazi Germany. For questions contact victoria.dunn@q.com.


Special Event: Soul Collages with the Tuesday morning Bible Study on March 29th!

Missions

Your Missions Team has been working through **Refugee Services** at the **Minnesota Council of Churches** the past two months to help three families from Afghanistan and one family from Myanmar! Brian B., Roy M., Dave K. and Leif R. did all the heavy lifting with JoAnn K., Vicki D. and Pat D.B. doing the light lifting and coordinating. A new Edina volunteer interpreter, Franci G. has also been helping with all this, plus she speaks two of the three languages in Afghanistan, so that has been very helpful. Please know that your generous donations are helping many lives. Right now, we don't need any more furnishings or clothes



but if you have an extra hour or two to help, we'd really appreciate it.

- The family of 13 from Myanmar had only two beds until we brought them 7 more, so all of them now have a comfortable place to sleep. We brought lots of furnishings they said they needed, too.
- We helped our first Afghan family with three van loads, two trailer loads, and one car load, full of furniture & furnishings which we collected from three different places over three days. Whew!
- Two new Afghan refugee mothers were very happy to go through all of the things the congregation has so generously donated. We filled two cars up with anything that their families could use including diapers since two babies are involved. We will be helping them more.
- One American family from Stonebridge whom we've previously helped has contracted Covid and wasn't able to work for one month, so we helped her with February's rent.
- Another American family we've previously helped has also benefitted from your generosity of clothing and furnishings by choosing things they needed.
- Steve K. took the 20-30 extra coats down to the Dignity Center, which is run by Hennepin Avenue UMC, since people need them NOW.



Refugee Services provide specialized services for individuals with humanitarian protection status to assist them on the path to self-sufficiency. They strive to provide excellent, holistic, family-centered services that provide abundant support to refugees and their families. They serve **Refugees**, **Asylees**, **Special Immigrant Visa** ("SIV") Holders, Cuban/Haitian Entrants, Victims of Trafficking, and AmerAsians for up to 5 years. It is part of the *Minnesota Council of Churches*.




Maintenance Minute

All Church Conference Minutes

Editor's Comment: After worship on January 30, 2022, over 40 individuals remained for our Administrative All Church Conference. A summary of the meeting is offered here, along with a copy of the 2022 budget that was adopted.

GOOD SAMARITAN UMC ALL CHURCH CONFERENCE MINUTES JANUARY 30, 2022 at 11:00 am

PASTOR UPDATE - Rev. Carol Zaagsma

Pastor Carol opened with prayer. She explained today's agenda would consist of reports made by committee chairs from SPRC, the Board of Trustees and Finance. Typically, we would also review membership rolls, but this review will be delayed until our June conference when hopefully we are able to take a more accurate count of our active membership.

Pastor Carol shared her top priorities for 2022. They include the following:

- Children, Youth and Family Ministries work closely with Jan and others to support our efforts to rebuild this area of our ministries.
- Digital Campus Initiative recognize that we essentially have two different worship services: pre-recorded online and in-person, and Pastor Carol will work closely with Christian and others to expand ministries with our online community through a combination of Zoom-only and hybrid meetings and ministry opportunities (this is in addition to the ongoing efforts to return to inperson gatherings and ministries).
- Focus on administrative systems and church culture – develop and implement administrative priorities, including improving church administrative procedures and policies, creating better documentation for reference when making decisions, and working with staff and leadership to break down silos.

STAFF/PARISH RELATIONS (SPRC) UPDATE - Caroline Carlin

Caroline explained that in 2021 SPRC worked very hard as illustrated by Good Sam's new hires:

- Nikki Holm Director of Congregational Care
- Paolo Debuque Chancel Choir Director
- Pastor Carol Zaagsma Lead Pastor
- Christian Nielsen Coordinator of Worship Arts and Online Engagement
- Paul McKenzie Chancel Chimes Director
- Mary Beth Berg Organist / Accompanist

This year SPRC will begin with a focus on filling the open Office Manager, Bookkeeper and newly opened Chancel Chimes Director positions.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES UPDATE - Rick Evans

Rick reported that the building and grounds have been well-maintained throughout the pandemic, and he does not have any significant concerns about Good Samaritan's buildings or grounds. Over the past year the Trustees were able to get the gas pipes on the church roof replaced. They worked with Hennepin County watershed district a few years ago to develop a rain garden in the north end of the parking lot, which will also help improve the health of the pond. This year we are at the point in our agreement where we will assume upkeep.

Rick also reported on the United Methodist Denomination's work to clarify the relationship between each individual church and the Boy Scout troops they currently charter.

The church roof sustained hail damage some time ago, and the contractor the trustees selected is negotiating with the insurance company to repair the damage. We're hoping the work will begin in the spring.

Finally, Rick expressed how pleased the trustees are with the work performance of Dan Green the church Building Engineer.

FINANCE UPDATE – Byron Olson

Byron highlighted the following from 2021:

- 2021 budget ended with \$11,415 surplus. \$5,412 was placed into the Evergreen Fund and \$6,003 was referred to the Foundation.
- Ending balance of the Reserve Fund is \$158,598 or 21% of the proposed 2022 budget.

2022 BUDGET PRESENTATION - Byron Olson

Byron reported the proposed 2022 budget is \$771,860 which is a 4% increase over 2021. The Finance Committee proposes this budget based in part of the following analysis:

- Income was projected from 2022 pledges along with a review of giving trends from 2021, and includes a transfer of \$9,000 from the Evergreen Fund, and a transfer of \$41,692 from reserves if necessary.
- The personnel budget represents 51% of the total budget, up 4% from last year's 47%.
- An additional three months of mortgage payments have been transitioned from the capital fund to the operating budget, so that now our budget represents 1/2 of our annual mortgage obligation.

The motion to approve the 2022 budget was approved unanimously.
