Pastor's Page

A Year In Review



On June 26, 2022, we had our Ministry All Church Conference to recognize the end of the program year, which loosely follows the school year. This was a great time of looking back on the year while also sharing exciting plans for what lies ahead. This edition of our newsletter contains summaries of these reports by various staff members, so I commend them to you.

The Minnesota Annual Conference asks all congregations to focus on what we know as the "Gospel Imperatives." The three gospel imperatives are to 1) Grow in Love of God and Neighbor (based on the Great Commandment in Matthew 22:37-40), 2) Reach New People (the Great Commission in Matthew 28:19-20) and 3) Heal a Broken World (the Great Proclamation in Luke 4:16-21).

The importance of these three gospel imperatives is evident in our organizational structure and in the way we carry out our ministries. For example, "Growing in Love of God and Neighbor" has been a primary focus through our worship themes as we have called ourselves back to who we are by looking closely at our vision statement as well as our Good Samaritan beliefs. "Reaching New People" is the primary reason we continue to enhance our online presence and expand our digital ministries. And "Healing a Broken World" is clearly a main motivator for our Missions Team.

At our Administrative All Church Conference in January, I named three priorities: 1) Support Jan in rebuilding our Children, Youth & Family Ministries; 2) Support Christian in our Digital Campus Initiatives; and 3) Continue working on systems and culture here at Good Sam. The reports made by staff during our June meeting illustrate the progress we've made in a relatively short period of time.

While we will continue to strengthen the opportunities named in those first three priorities, our progress thus far enables me to bring into focus two additional priorities: 1) I've applied for a spot in the Leadership Center for Social Justice inaugural cohort at United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities, which is a nine-month commitment funded through a Lilly Endowment Grant. If selected, I will be using the framework of this program to work with the Missions Team and other key leaders to incorporate a more substantial social justice focus to our ministries at Good Sam; and 2) Entering a time of discernment with our congregation to identify an 8-year strategic plan for what and how we intend to be church by the year 2030.

Psalm 104 talks about God's Spirit renewing the face of the earth. I believe God's Spirit is doing such renewing work right here at Good Samaritan UMC, and it is truly a privilege to be a part of it with you.

Near the beginning of this past program year, I transitioned from being an independent contractor to being an employee of Good Samaritan, tasked with continuing to produce online worship, to work to enhance in-person worship, and to lead our efforts to become a digitally connected, 21st Century Church. I'm excited by the work we're doing to grow as a congregation into new spaces. While there is still much to do, I'm proud of the things we've achieved.

In-Person Transition

As many of you know, our sanctuary video system was mostly installed at the beginning of the pandemic. During the pandemic fog, the system wasn't quite completed; it sat for over a year along with our sound system and had multiple problems. Dan Rogers-Green and I worked hard with our vendor to fix the problems and get our system running. As you can see today, it's finally up and running smoothly and reliably. We created a core AV team to meet the needs of in-person worship, which includes Joan Hirsch, Jeff Jelen, Brad Carlin, Dave Knutson, and myself. We're starting to move into the work of developing a vision for our use of images and sound for in-person worship.

Online Worship

In collaboration with program staff, music staff, and volunteers, we are continuing to produce our online worship as its own distinct worship experience. This service has been cited by the Minnesota Annual Conference as the "gold standard" for online worship, and we still have approximately 70-140 views of our weekly online services since returning to offering in-person services.

Digital Team

We have formed and are working to grow our Digital Team, which is working to develop online strategies and advise in content creation. Currently the team consists of Dave Knutson, Christina Leenders, Joel Stegner, Pastor Carol, and myself. We welcome new members! Our first objective has been to create our Good Samaritan Online Community Facebook group, which is a way we can engage, converse, and communicate as a community, and provide a space for new ways to be church. We're at 68 members. Please join us as we continue to grow this community.

- 1. Rally Day: We hosted a string orchestra during worship with the Chancel Choir supporting with prerecorded music. Homeward Bound played after worship during an ice cream social.
- 2. Advent: We piloted a new annual offering, a collaborative Lessons and Carols service involving all the church's musical groups, doubling as a fundraiser for music programming. It was a successful first iteration, and we're looking forward to continuing to offer it!
- 3. Advent: Also in advent, the Chancel Choir recorded Benjamin Britten's Ceremony of Carols, featuring a professional harpist and masterfully recorded and edited by Christian Nielsen.

- 2. AAPI Month: Another pilot program, bringing in multiple Asian-American/Pacific Islander musicians over the month of May to share their experiences with us through music.
- 3. Final Sunday: A festive Chancel Choir and Homeward Bound collaboration.

This being my first year at Good Sam, I've been so happy and grateful for the opportunity to help bring music back to full strength, as well as having the space to try out new things!

The main goals for next year are:

- Children and Youth programming! In collaboration with Jan, we'd like to reintroduce music activities for children and youth at Good Sam, starting with a fun project in Advent for all interested (stay tuned!)
- 2. Develop successful programming: Build on the past year's successes with Lessons and Carols and AAPI month, and continue looking for opportunities for thoughtful innovation.

Congregational Care, as we transitioned from fully virtual to partially virtual, included a variety of small group ministry opportunities as well as stand alone events. Some small group invitations have been seasonal and some are on-going as they weave themselves into the fabric of our lives here at Good Sam. The hope is to provide a multitude of ways for people to be connected to and grow in connection with one another, themselves, and God.

With that intent in mind, let's take a look at Congregational Care - A Year In Review: July 1, 2021 - June 30, 2022:

On-Going Small Group Offerings:

- The Compassion Collective: Meets the 3rd Friday of every month from 3:30-4:45pm both in-person and via Zoom simultaneously
- Caregivers' Support Group: Meets the 2nd Wednesday of every month from 6:00-7:00pm in-person only (via Zoom in case of emergencies)

Short-Term Small Group Offerings:

- Remembering Your Story: Creating Your Own Spiritual Autobiography: A 10-week series held in-person at Good Sam during the Fall of 2021
- The Book of Joy: Lasting Happiness in a Changing World: An 8-week book discussion held over Zoom during the Spring of 2022

Stand Alone Events:

- July 27, 2021: Celebration of Life for and on behalf of the Tuesday Morning Bible Study in honor of those members they had lost since the beginning of the pandemic
- December 21, 2021: Blue Christmas Worship: A Service of Hope




It was a fantastic week. The crafts! So many fun, messy, hands-on art! Everyone had a great time!

- Bible Sunday Bibles were given to our 3-year-olds, our 3rd graders and our 9th graders going into Confirmation. They were hand delivered to the friends who were still not quite comfortable being indoors for worship.
- Our 2nd annual Drive-Through Mini-Boo had both church friends and neighbors drive through!

Winter 2021-22

- It was great to be able to have Hanging of the Greens in person after not having this beloved event due to the pandemic in 2020.
- Advent Pageant—COVID-style. Our kiddos dressed up as shepherds and angels and helped tell the nativity story.
- In an effort to keep connected to our young adults, care packages were sent in December and a Valentine's Day card was sent in February.
- In January of this year, we revived in-person Sunday School for our elementary-age and younger kiddos, and re-opened the nursery.

Spring 2022

- A very well-received family event, the Ukrainian Egg Day was well attended and a great way for our families to start to reconnect.
- Our Easter Craft Extravaganza featured several craft stations and a selfie station that resulted in some great pictures and fun take-home crafts.
- The Confirmands, to conclude a year of study and meetings with mentors, went on a fun
 and interesting field trip to Lakewood Cemetery. We confirmed five students and gave two
 students certificates of completion.
- Our Senior recognition Sunday featured a small video of our nine graduating High School Seniors. Gifts were given to them all.

Missions

Missions Annual Report - May 2021 through May 2022

Thanks to the generosity of Good Samaritan's members, the Missions Team was able to give over \$40,000, countless volunteer hours, and in-kind donations to many charities and individuals. Your Mission Team has been very busy helping people deal with homelessness, hunger, education, and inclusiveness - our key issues. We've been using social media successfully to involve the community with our various collections, so many non-members also contribute to our work. We focus on these six main areas:

HELPING REFUGES – We delivered 8 beds and many furnishings to one family of 13 from Myanmar. We've been helping 3 Afghan families with furniture, food, clothes, and furnishings over several months; we are currently "befriending" one Afghan family of 7 with weekly visits (grocery shopping, English lessons). Refugee Services from the MN Council of Churches vets and facilitates this. We sent \$2,225 to help Ukraine via UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief).

EDUCATION: We gave \$5,500 to these groups: the Wesley Campus Foundation at the U of M, Joyce Preschool, A Better Chance (ABC), Stonebridge World School, and Camphor UMC Scholarship Fund. We're involved in various ways with STONEBRIDGE WORLD SCHOOL: Four Good Sam members volunteer weekly to run the Stonebridge library; we delivered over six carloads of furnishings, along with gift cards, to needy families there; we used \$8,661 for our Stonebridge Family Rent Support program - ALL 17 Stonebridge families we helped are independent of our help now!

AFRICAN EDUCATION: We wrote and obtained a \$3,095 grant from the Good Samaritan Foundation for a science lab in a school in Baiwalla, Sierra Leone. We also collected about 400 books and educational games to also send to that school which the Hennepin Ave UMC started. We currently want to set up various scholarships for girls at \$310 each to ensure that they can attend school.

FOOD SHELVES: We donated \$6,300 to various groups: VEAP, Joyce Uptown Food Shelf, Feed My Starving Children, Meals on Wheels, and Brooklyn Center UMC Food Pantry; during MN Foodshare we donated 344 pounds of food and \$10,405. We also gave them 12 cases of diapers during our diaper drive. Members regularly pack food for Feed My Starving Children (FMSC);

HOUSING: We gave \$7,000 to various housing groups: Simpson Housing services, Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, Hearts and Hammers, and Emma Norton Services (for women and families experiencing homelessness). We also donated \$2,000 to the MN Annual Conference Love Offering. Many Good Sam members and the community donated about 60 bags and boxes of furnishings and clothing to distribute to needy families and refugees. We created 26 UMCOR buckets for emergency relief.

INCLUSIVITY - LGBTQIA+: We hosted a showing of the film "They Know Not What They Do" that focuses on the Supreme Court legalizing marriage equality. Good Samaritan also served as a host site for a live-stream program for the Spring Gathering of the Minnesota Reconciling Ministries. We set up a booth in Loring Park for the PRIDE festival with information on the reconciling congregations.

With the establishment of this scholarship, her parents, Jack and Ware Washam, celebrate Lauren's curiosity about the world and the people around her, her passion for service, her endless humor and wit, and her unbounded love for friends and family.

Lauren grew up in Edina and was very active at Good Samaritan United Methodist Church. In June 2019, Lauren was diagnosed with sarcoma, a rare and aggressive form of cancer. She met each challenge with grace, strength and positivity, and while her life was too brief, she was an inspiration to many.

The goal with this memorial scholarship is to build a legacy that will impact lives far into the future, a positive movement that will be the greatest testament to Lauren's loving spirit. The scholarship, once funded, will be an endowed scholarship that continues in perpetuity.



Newsletter Extra - Beware of Scams

Following is a word of caution from Pastor Carol:

Scammers are targeting members of our congregation again with messages that appear to be from me. These interactions can appear legitimate and result in you being a victim of fraud, and are common in many churches. Here's an example of a recent interaction between scammers and a member of our congregation:

"Hi (name), are you available? I need a favor, text me back when you get my text.

- Rev. Carol Zaagsma"

After the congregation member replied, the following text was received:

"I would like to spend \$300. I need you to get 3 iTunes cards of \$100 denominations total \$300. When you get the cards, take them off the paper pack, take pictures of the code numbers on the cards and send directly to the nurse at the hospital via julesemily02@gmail.com. I will get the physical cards from you tomorrow morning and reimburse you. Make sure you

indicate that the cards are from me. Many thanks."

After engaging with the scammers (who were posing as me), our congregation member received another message saying I needed another \$500. Upon calling the text message phone number, the number rang but then had a recorded message saying "this number is no longer in service or the line is not in use."

Anyone can get swept up in a scam like this. Please know that I will **never** reach out to you by text or email asking for money to be wired or gift cards to be purchased for me or anyone else. If there is an opportunity for you to help with a need, you will hear a broad appeal from me directly on Sunday mornings (such as with the VEAP school supply drive or opportunity to bring clothes for a refugee family needing seasonal clothes) or through public communications such as the newsletter or Wednesday Highlights. Please give me a call to verify before taking action on a seemingly private request such as the text messages above.

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
