This summer we will explore sacred themes with a National Park Series during both online and in-person worship. Come each week as we celebrate creation and the wisdom she brings us.

We are also planning a few opportunities to gather to enjoy and experience the sacred together. While these plans are still falling into place, there is an opportunity in June you might be interested in.

Rev. Jerad Morey is certified by the Association of Nature and Forest Therapies, and also a colleague and friend of Pastor Carol. Jerad is offering a River Bend Forest Therapy Walk in Faribault on June 10 from 9:30-12:00 that is open to the public.

Forest Therapy is a practice based on forest bathing – a Japanese method that is all about immersing people in the natural environment around them to improve their overall health. Studies suggest this practice can significantly lower cortisol levels. Each forest therapy session ends with a cup of tea made from nature, with ingredients Jerad knows are safe.

Homeward Bound Gigs This Summer



Worship Updates

As we enter summer, I find myself reflecting on our past program year at Good Samaritan. We've had some challenges, but we've had even more successes. The special seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter, as well as our recent AAPI concert have been opportunities for collaboration across disciplines and teams. We've worked to bring beautiful worship experiences in both the online and in-person settings, and worked to reach out into the community. I'm grateful for the way Good Sam can pitch in to get things done, and for all of the support the community has offered this ministry.

AV Open House

After in-person worship on Sunday June 11, there will be a no-obligation time to check out our sanctuary AV system, to see how it works and determine if being a volunteer AV tech is right for you. We need some more people to help us in this ministry. It's much easier than it looks.

Sharing on Facebook: a simple way you can help

Facebook has been a valuable tool for Good Samaritan's outreach. While spending money to advertise on the platform is really cost-effective, we've also seen that your sharing of our events, ads, and videos makes a huge difference. The more we like, share and comment, the more visible Facebook makes our content to a broader audience. With our advertisement for in-person Easter worship, we spent \$12 and had five shares. Through the paid ad we reached 737 people, but our organic unpaid reach was 592. That organic reach came largely because we shared this event. That video was viewed over 1100 times by people in our local community. We had a similar experience with our video ad for our "A Thousand Tongues" AAPI concert, where we reached 6,543 people. 5,203 people were reached through the paid ad, but 1,267

came through organic spread. We paid \$16 to boost our Easter Worship on Facebook and had 7 shares. Together, the impact was that our online worship reached 6,608 people with more than 2,800 views on Facebook alone. From April 7 to May 4, through our combined efforts of strategic advertising and working together to create organic growth, nearly 15,000 people saw our content as they scrolled through their Facebook feeds - an in-

crease of over 400%.
They may not have all clicked our content, but they saw our name, our logo and saw just a tiny bit of

Now Open to All



Keeping Families out of Homelessness

It often takes just one crisis to push families into the risk of losing their homes. We've partnered with the inner-city Stonebridge World School for over 15 years and their social worker informs us of families in crisis. In May, the Missions Team helped prevent two families with children who attend Stonebridge from falling into homeless-

ness by giving each family \$1,500 for their rent. For one family, the single mother had to stop

working for a while to care for her son. And although she is back at work now, she fell behind in her rent and was facing eviction. As for the other family, their car was vandalized - broken windows and slashed tires. This single mother works two part-time jobs, but the expense of car repairs and loss of transportation put the family at risk. The help from Good Samaritan to cover a month's rent for each family eased their crisis tremendously and helped them to stay in secure housing. churches to his years in seminary, and now as an educator for faith communities worldwide.



Foundation Update

The Board of Directors of The Foundation held their Q2 meeting on May 18. The balances of the three funds of The Foundation were:

Outreach Fund \$259, 672
 Cornerstone Fund \$77,163
 Evergreen Fund \$269,920

The Cornerstone Fund will be tapped to pay for fascia repair to the church building in the amount of \$3,152. The Finance Committee expects to request their annual draw, this year \$13,000, late this summer or early fall depending on the cash flow through the summer months.

Three grants were approved. One to AVIVO, a non-profit in Minneapolis. The second to Bountifield International, a non-profit located in Minneapolis that creates opportunities across Africa for rural farmers and entrepreneurs to improve farming methods and distribution of crops. And the third to provide the remaining funds needed to purchase and install a defibrillator in the gym area of the church building.

Don't forget about the generous offer by a church member to match donations to any of the funds of The Foundation up to \$10,000. Donations to the Evergreen Fund help support our operating budget. Donations to the Cornerstone Fund support maintenance of our building and grounds. And donations to the Outreach Fund support those in need locally, nationally, and globally. Maintenance Minute: Finished at Last!

I cannot tell you how excited I am to finally have the sanctuary roof replacement job complete! It was an ongoing issue for at least six years with the leaking and cleanup needed. Most of that roof is at a slope except for all four corners, where the slope comes down to a

small flat roof. The major spot that was leaking was the northeast corner.

Roughly four years ago we had all of those flat roofs replaced. The roofing company at the time thought this would remedy the situation. After getting them replaced it still leaked! They tried other various things, but could never fully pinpoint where it was coming in. One of the biggest issues for me with this was when the water traveled down the beams, it would collect the lacquer finish that covers the beams, and by the time it made it to the floor, it was not only water, but a mix of water and lacquer. This looked a lot like coffee when it was on the ground and when it would dry, it would harden like tree sap. It was very difficult to get this off the ground and especially the pew fabric!

As soon as the roofers finished with the very last piece of tin roof, we had a couple days of pretty hard rain. From that time up until today, the new roof has not leaked a drop! I always have a handful of collection containers on hand for roof leaks that may come up, but I'm hoping these containers don't need to be brought into the sanctuary for many years to come!
