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Pastor's Page

The Road Ahead

Rev. Cindy Gregorson joined the Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) for our October meeting to share the process and next steps related to appointing the next Lead Pastor of Good Samaritan UMC.

One of the first steps is to complete a church profile with demographic and historical data, along with particular ministry needs of the congregation and neighborhood, as well as skills needed of a Lead Pastor to lead the congregation into the future. SPRC, with help from the Church Council, has completed this step. Three primary areas of skill needed by our next Lead Pastor include strong and adaptive leadership, clear and transparent communication, and an authentic and relational connection for strong partnerships with lay members.

During our conversation with Rev. Gregorson, three opportunities emerged for the congregation and our next Lead Pastor to focus on: 1) developing a more intentional process around the visitor experience and follow-up; 2) building a discipleship process that encourages each person to grow deeper in their faith; 3) dive deeper into social justice ministries and perhaps identify a signature ministry that we might be known for in the community.

At the same time churches are working on their profiles, pastors also complete an individual profile which outlines the gifts and skills they bring. Both the congregation and pastor profiles will be instrumental in identifying a good missional match for our church. A deep level of discerning and prayer accompanies both churches and clergy in this whole process.

Once a few potential candidates are identified, SPRC will be given a chance to review the pastoral profiles of each candidate (without names or other clearly identifying information) to determine which candidate to invite to an introductory meeting. The introductory meeting is like an interview, but more for the purposes of discerning together between Good Sam leaders, pastoral candidate, and the annual conference leadership that this will be a good appointment for everyone. If this introductory meeting goes well, then an announcement would be made soon after that. We are hopeful that this will happen in February or March.

Pastoral transitions are always tender times. It can be hard to say good-



bye, while also kind of exciting to imagine the skills and gifts the next leader will bring. Please know that you are in **my prayers every single day; and if you're not already, l** hope you will begin praying also for this transition ahead, that God will bring just the right next leader here, so that our community, congregation, and pastor will be blessed by some amazing ministry together.

O, taste and see that the Lord is good! Happy are those who take refuge in God! ~ Psalm 34:8

And so give thanks for the sweetness of dear Christian friends as you place the bowl of sweet potatoes on the table; remember the blessings from selfless volunteering which arose within you as you lay forth the basket of rolls; consider how prayer covered your life with warm richness as the gravy tureen is filled; and give thanks for all those times of worship and bible study as the roast beast is carved thin, plattered and placed in the center.

Savor and give thanks for these blessings from God for both your body and soul. Invite as many as you can to this table of friendship and love. Do not starve yourself any longer, for the Lord's bounty is available for all.

Oh! And be sure to leave room for pie, remembering that the best is yet to come! Whether alone or in the company of dear ones, may you taste once again and see that the Lord is good.



Dear Good Sam Families,

There has been a lot of hard news to hear recently. It is hard not to hear about the difficulties in the Middle East. Our kids know something is up. I thought you might find these tips helpful for sharing hard news with children. You can use these tips for any tough topic.

- Be honest and tell the truth. Certainly, we need to speak to their level of understanding, but being clear and honest is the best option.
- Think about what you are going to say. Practice it with another adult, in the mirror, or in your head. (I am always willing to listen and work with you. Give me a call.)
- Use direct eye contact.
- Pick your time to talk when there is time and space to have this conversation.
- Ask them what they have heard or what they know. You can tailor your response from there.
- Be loving and give comfort; let them know they are safe.
- Listen to them, and accept their feelings. They can run the gamut.
- Make sure they know they are not responsible or at fault.
- Give them a chance to ask questions.
- Brainstorm ways you as a family can help. (Praying is always a good first step.)
- Praise your child for having this conversation.

Hopefully, this is helpful for you. Raising thoughtful, caring and resilient children is a hard job that takes a village. I am honored to be in your village.

What Food Shelves Need



In all the years we have donated food to VEAP or Joyce Food Shelf, most of us have never asked what the people who go there might have to say.

Someone did ask and below is what people said they want and need. Please note that money is always welcome at the food shelves since they can buy in bulk. However, buying in bulk can limit the variety of items; i.e., maybe they can only buy the cans of plain tomatoes, and the ones with spices are more appreciated.

Also, buying items yourself is really a good experience, especially for kids and grandkids to do, so they become more aware of the many needy people out there.

- Spices or salt and pepper would be a real Christmas gift.
- Boxed milk is a treasure, as kids need it for cereal.
- Everyone donates pasta sauce and spaghetti noodles, so give other things.
- Donate can openers or buy cans with pop tops.
- Oil is a luxury but needed for Rice a-Roni, which is often at food banks.
- Feminine hygiene products are a luxury and women will cry over that.
- Tea bags and coffee make them feel like you care.
- Sugar and flour are treats.
- They fawn over fresh produce*.
- Everyone loves Stove Top Stuffing.
- They rarely get fresh meat*. Hamburger Helper goes nowhere without ground beef.
- Tuna and crackers make a good lunch.
- They get lots of peanut butter and jelly but usually not sandwich bread.
- Butter or margarine is nice too*.
- Everyone donates Kraft Mac and Cheese in the box, but milk and butter are rare at food banks*.

- Cake mix and frosting makes it possible to make a child's birthday cake – did you know that a can of Sprite can substitute for eggs and oil to make a cake?! Write this tidbit on the cake mix.
- Dishwashing detergent is very expensive so always appreciated.
- Seeds are nice in the spring and summer.

*Check with your food shelf to see if they accept refrigerated items such as meat, dairy, etc. as VEAP and Joyce do not. Fresh produce is welcomed at VEAP. Websites often list what is accepted at each food shelf.

Building Homes and Hope



Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, a group of about 100 churches, temples, and synagogues whose goal is to

provide affordable housing, is building homes! Please help us count the ways:

- 1. Construction on Emerson Village is underway in North Minneapolis. Stay tuned as \$150,000 is still needed from private sources to build Emerson Village.
- 2. Swift action of Beacon advocates and local allies in Shakopee is moving the plan forward for more than 40 high-quality professionally managed apartment homes for low-income families. Ground-breaking is anticipated next spring. Prairie Pointe is the project name.
- 3. Next up is Aster Commons in Richfield. The vision of Aster Commons focuses on providing 40 apartment homes for neurodivergent young adults who have or are at risk of experiencing homelessness, especially low-income BIPOC individuals.
- 4. Help Unlock the Metro: Beacon has worked for years to change the Met Council's annual plan so that it awards project-based vouchers (PBVs) automatically every year. You can email your Met Council member to let them know what a good idea this is.

Sue Cleaveland and Kent Holmes then welcomed her to stay at their home. We then started apartment hunting! We got the perfect apartment at a nice location on a bus line that goes straight to Stonebridge and got a bike donated for her since she is without a car. We also got her furniture and all the necessities, all donated, to set up an apartment and delivered them to her new apartment on Friday, October 20. She is now on her own but has four American "mothers" and two "fathers" watching over her and ready to help when she needs it. We look forward to her cooking a promised Iranian meal for us. Watch for her, and give her a warm welcome, when she visits Good Samaritan soon on a Sunday morning! Thank you to all who housed Niyousha, donated items, and helped us deliver them -Sue, Kent, Brian Boysen, and Mike Olauson.


Annual Pledge Drive
