Reflecting Amid the Turn of the Calendar



This is the time of year when I seem to take stock of bigger life issues...looking back on the previous year...looking forward to the next...and evaluating how it is with my soul right here and now amid the transition between the two.

I recently viewed an article that seems to put this year's annual rhythm of reflection in a slightly different light. The article summarized the writings of Bronnie Ware, who wrote a

memoir after working as a caregiver in palliative care for a number of years. Palliative care is similar, yet different, from hospice care, in that it offers long-term care and relief from pain and symptoms related to a disease or chronic disorder. As time went on, many of her patients died. Through her memoir, she gives voice to those who have died, sharing themes found in their departing wisdom about what they would have done differently in life, given the chance again.

The first theme – "I wish I'd had the courage to live a life true to myself, not the life others expected of me." This was the most common regret of all, according to the author's interactions with the patients. At the end of life, it's easier to see clearly what dreams have gone unfulfilled. What makes it hard is knowing that many of the dreams were unfulfilled due to choices made, or not made, due to pressure from others.

The second theme – "I wish I didn't work so hard." This was a prevalent theme for every male patient, many having missed their children's youth and their partner's companionship. And it was noted as a regret by their family members, too...by the children and partners who also suffered because of their absence.


The third theme – "I wish I'd had the courage to express my feelings." Many described suppressing their feelings in order to keep peace with others, and sometimes this led to them carrying bitterness and resentment. Those who did speak honestly often found in the end that it raised a relationship to a whole new level that was ultimately much healthier.

The fourth theme – "I wish I had stayed in touch with my friends." There were many deep regrets about not giving friendships the time and effort they deserved.

The fifth theme – "I wish that I had let myself be happier." Fear of change had many pretending that they were content, when deep down they longed to laugh deeply and bring some silliness back into their lives again.

I'll admit that many of these observations resonated with me. Fortunately, there are life lessons learned by others that we can also learn from. Words of wisdom like this, along with a fuller faith that comes from what we learn and experience as a congregation, can prompt changes or adjustments to our own priorities. So, I share these themes with you in hopes they will shape some of your own reflections as we usher in the New Year.



A New Year's Success Story

There's a success story told by Robert Fulghum in his book *It Was on Fire When I Lay Down on It* (Villard Books) about a man who, it might appear at first glance, died a failure.

John Pierpont was his name. Pierpont graduated from Yale and chose education as his profession. However, he was a failure as a teacher. He was too easy on his students. So, he turned to the legal profession.

He was a failure as a lawyer. He was too generous to his clients and too concerned about justice to take cases that brought good fees. So, he tried dry goods next.

He was a failure at business too. He was too liberal with credit and didn't charge enough for his goods. He tried writing poetry and then tried being a minister. He failed at both endeavors. He even tried politics. He ran for governor of Massachusetts. He ran for Congress. He failed to win either race.

Someone finally found him an obscure job in the back office of the Treasury Department in Washington, D.C. and he finished the last five years of his life as a file clerk.

Of course, Fulghum points out, elements of Pierpont's life story militate against calling him a failure. His commitment to social justice, his desire to be a loving human being, his active engagement in the great issues of his time, and his great faith in the power of the human mind—these are not failures!

But every winter, especially in the colder climates, we celebrate his success for something entirely different. In our hearts and minds, we carry a memorial to him for a song.

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John Pierpont wrote Jingle Bells.

In his book, Fulghum says aptly: "To write a song that stands for the simplest joys, to write a song that three or four hundred million people around the world know — a song about something they may have never done but can imagine — a song that every one of us, large and small, can hoot out the moment the chord is struck on the piano and the chord is struck in our spirit — that's not failure."

As we turn the page of our calendars to another year ahead, let us remember to not judge our successes by worldly standards, but to use every gift and grace that God has given us to its fullest, and leave the results in God's hands. Every act is a testimony to our faith in what God can do through us. Let us not be deflated by those who would proclaim us to be failures; instead, use every good gift from God for God's glory.

"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. If anyone speaks, they should do so as one who speaks the very words of God. If anyone serves, they should do so with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ. To him be the glory and the power for ever and ever. Amen."

Happy New Year!

As we journey into 2024, even though we wish it was not so, I suspect our lives will continue to become busier and busier! Finding time for all that we wish to do is very hard, I have been thinking about ways to sneak a little more God into our everyday lives. For 2024, I will be suggesting a spiritual practice that you can do at home with your family. From toddlers to teens, we can find five minutes to connect with God! So let's set the stage.

For January, create a small sacred place in your home. Is there a coffee table, a shelf in the breakfast nook, a small table in the family room that you can add or use? Maybe even a shelf in the mud room might work, somewhere

when it is already in your daily path. There are no rules or re-

strictions for creating this space. If you are tight on space, consider using a basket to hold your items.

Choose some meaningful items that remind you of God., something to involve your senses.

- A cross, big or small
- A candle to remind you Jesus is the light of the world, battery operated ones are great for this
- A plant, flowers, a rock, or seashell something from nature to remind you God is the Creator
- Incense or essential oils to create a sensory experience with smell
- Fabric to create an altar space to reflect the various seasons of the year
- Pictures of family or friends, some type of heirloom or memento

Be intentional with the time; it doesn't have to be long, just intentional. Begin with a deep breath and a prayer, light the candle, read a passage of scripture, a poem or singing a song. If your gathering time is at the end of the day, ask each other where they saw God today. If your time is as you are leaving for the day, how will you show God's love to someone today. Either is a great time to remind you family of how much you love them, that God loves them, and that their church family loves them. Ask if there is something you can pray about for them, a test, a difficult fellow student, thanksgiving for a great teacher or grown up, what ever is on their heart. Don't forget to tell them what they can pray for you too! Then close in prayer. This process can be just five minutes, but a truly meaningful five minutes.

This practice can really help ground your family and build those strong connections to carry the whole family through our very busy lives! Once a day or once a week, it doesn't matter, just start!

The Baiwalla School is growing!

First, Judith Banya returned to her hometown, Baiwalla, Sierra Leone, from the USA after becoming a minister and started a Methodist Church there. Then she started the Richard Ormsby High School and added grades 4th - 6th. She then started a farm to help provide lunches and income for the school and help the students learn farming. Next, she started a store to provide income for the school, help students learn to run a store, and provide a larger variety of foods and goods for the town of Baiwalla, which has only one small store. This year they built a new elementary school and added grades 1st - 3rd!

Good Samaritan is helping them by providing \$3,000 to cover teacher's salaries. Last year we sent them books and supplies to start a library in the high school. We also are planning to send down lots and lots of books to get the students reading. We need your help to do that! We will start collecting children and youth books in January. They need beginning readers, chapter books, and non-fiction at all levels. So, save your books and watch for collection boxes in the Narthex and Collection

area one floor down by the elevator. Pat Deckas Becerra and JoAnn Knutson will travel with a group to Baiwalla in March and make sure the books in the elementary school classrooms are ready for the students to check out and read, read, read!
