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# Pastor's Page

### A Lesson in Contrasts

As December 2023 turned into January 2024, our worship themes had us looking at one of my favorite spiritual images: Light. On Christmas Eve, we took a closer look at the African American Spiritual "This Little Light of Mine," and noted in particular that Jesus is like a candle, while our role is to be like a mirror, reflecting his light into the world.

Then we celebrated Epiphany on the first Sunday of the new year. Music during in-person worship that day included "Star Carol" by John Rutter, along with the hymn, "I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light," while we focused on the star as it led the magi to Jesus. The week after that, we began our current worship series on the I AM statements of Jesus, starting with "I AM the Light of the World." Light is a central image in scripture, and indeed, our very faith journey. So perhaps it will surprise you that I want to spend just a moment here focusing on the dark.

In some ways, we've been enculturated to fear the dark. The darkness can bring uncomfortable times of wrestling with deep soul questions. It can be a time ripe for feeling deep sorrows. It can also be frightening, especially when you don't know what is lurking beyond what you can see. Because of this, many of us try to avoid it - you need only count the number of nightlights in your house to see evidence of this.

In contrast, Barbara Brown Taylor, in her book *Learning to Walk in the Dark*, invites us to take a deeper look at the darkness of our lives. She writes, "I have learned things in the dark that I could never have learned in the light, things that have saved my life over and over again, so that there is really only one logical conclusion. I need darkness as much as I need light."

The prophet Isaiah seems to recognize this as he writes, "I will give you the treasures of darkness and riches hidden in secret places, so that you may know that it is I, the Lord, the God of Israel, who call you by your name." (Isaiah 45:3)

I know that for me, I have found this to be true - that God will call you by your name...especially in your darkest moments. So while our dark days or nights can be uncomfortable, they also enable us to lean differently on a God who is there, calling you by your name.

What can light possibly mean without dark? In fact, Martin Luther King Jr. noted that "Only when it's dark enough can you see the stars."



If you're walking in a moment of darkness, please know that you are not alone; and that while the darkness can be frightening, it is also what can enable you to see the light more clearly. So try to embrace it rather than run from it. Be open to what you might learn while it surrounds you. And trust that God has not abandoned you.

# Staff Parish Relations Committee

### Pastoral Transition Discernment Process Underway

Your Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) members have been working diligently as we are amidst the discernment process for our new Lead Pastor who will succeed Pastor Carol as she moves to a new leadership appointment within the Minnesota Conference.



Prior to Christmas, SPRC worked on our church profile, which contains demographic information about our community, historic information about our congregation, and identified leadership strengths needed for the emerging areas of focus and ministry opportunities here at Good Sam. We also developed our questions for the in-person discernment meeting. In addition, we had a start-up meeting with Rev. Cindy Gregorson, Director of Connectional Ministries and Clergy Assistant to the Bishop for the Minnesota Conference. She is also serving as our church's Superintendent, so SPRC met with her to discuss the missional needs of our congregation.

The New Year started off quickly for us, as we reviewed the credentials of the three highly qualified Lead Pastor candidates in mid-January; we provided feedback on each candidate to Rev. Gregorson who will review this feedback with the Minnesota Conference Bishop and Cabinet. The next step of the process is for the Cabinet to take our feedback and narrow the discernment to the sole pastoral candidate. Then Rev. Gregorson will meet with the pastoral candidate to share the missional needs of Good Sam UMC and why the Cabinet believes her/ him/them to be the best candidate.

Our tentative plan is to have an in-person discernment meeting with the Lead Pastor candidate in mid-February where the pastoral candidate and the SPRC each have the opportunity to affirm the Bishop's intent to appoint this person to Good Sam, or to ask for a reconsideration. Once agreed upon, we will announce the news during the following Sunday's church services along with a letter sent to the congregation immediately following the announcement.

We ask for your continued prayers during this time of discernment as we prepare for Good Sam UMC's next leadership chapter.

# Congregational Care

### Spiritual Health & Vitality

Whenever I take a health check-up these days, they have me complete a form online beforehand so the doctor can more readily identify needs and areas of concern. What strikes me is that the form not only asks questions regarding recent pain or problems, but also covers such areas as family history, mental health, exercise routines, levels of stress, financial burdens, and the like. These answers are correlated with statistics they collect from my weight, height, waist measurements, and blood sample. A report comes to me with a health score, warning flags, and recommendations for even greater health and vitality. I often think, "Wouldn't it be great if the same kind of report could be generated for our spiritual health and vitality as well?!"

In a simplified manner, it does. Whenever I lead Confirmation, I begin by laying out a basic model that the class will follow and explain that it can easily be applied to the rest of their lives. Jesus is concerned about ALL of you, your entire spiritual well-being, not just one part of who you are. Therefore, we need to pay attention to ALL parts, namely your HEAD, HEART, HANDS (both right and left), and FEET. In spiritual terms, these areas look like this:

HEAD – growing in one's knowledge of God and the world, including such things as Bible study, theological thought, history and context, and other holy readings;

HEART – connecting with the holy both publicly and privately, including such things as attending and actively participating in praise and worship experiences, receiving devotional and inspirational messages, going on spiritual retreats, attending Christian concerts, and an active prayer life;



RIGHT HAND – reaching out (like a handshake) to be in community with others, including times for fun and fellowship, building trust, sharing of personal matters, offering care and support, learning about conflict resolution, and making friends outside one's usual circles; Jim Beard (he/him)

LEFT HAND – reaching out to serve others, including helping the needy around the block and around the world, volunteering at church, sharing talents strictly for the benefit of others, and building God's kingdom wherever it is found;

FEET – putting one's faith into everyday action, including such things as involvement in social justice activities, witnessing, evangelizing, tithing, and making ethical decisions at work, school, and home.

I discovered that kids often excelled in one or two areas, and these varied from teenager to teenager. It was great to see each find their passion and continue to strengthen it. But I also warned them not to neglect the other areas after they were confirmed; yes, thrive in the parts that energize you but make sure the other areas of your spiritual life receive some regular attention. For example: dive in and sing weekly in the youth choir, but also participate in at least one Bible Study each year; sign up to help at Habitat for Humanity one day each summer; go to at least two fun events annually to stay in touch with each other; joyfully praise God with others somehow each week; etc. You may not love every activity, but your spiritual health and vitality will score high if you do.

So, how about you? Is it time for your spiritual assessment? Jesus is concerned about ALL of you!

Why in the world is the "greatest story ever told" not told in the same way by our four Gospel writers? The story told in each gospel is certainly as gripping and dramatic as any we could hope to hear, but they clearly

give strikingly different versions of the same events regarding Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. Was one witness more accurate in relaying the facts than the other three and therefore is "the more reliable truth"? Should we only consider elements that are present in all four as "the unquestionable truth"? Or perhaps if we meld them all together does the composite reveal "a more complete truth"? Actually, a more satisfying and ultimately more engaging approach will be for us to take each one of the four accounts on its own terms, and allow each witness to speak "the gospel truth" (aka the Good News) in his unique and powerful ways. Join us as we let the truths which each Gospel witness has to share come alive, not only for the people of that day but for us as well. Pastor Jim Beard will be leading this 6-session course.



There is one thing that drives me to anger and frustration faster than anything else: the dreaded Middle School Car Line at drop-off time. I am past that stage in my parenthood journey, but it is not easily forgotten. Until I started seeing it differently.

I was at a conference that talked about finding small pockets of time to connect with your children. It dawned on me that perhaps we could change those ten minutes that I dreaded so much into something special. After all, we were all captive in the car, so we could try to make it meaningful. I started asking my kids what they were looking forward to that day, what they were anxious about and how could I pray for them during the day. When we were two cars away from our turn to "tuck and roll" I would remind them that they were deeply loved by their parents, other trusted adults, and, of course, God. No matter what happened that day, that would never change.

Some mornings we would forget to have this check -in time, because either I didn't have enough coffee in me or they were not awake enough to really connect, but we did our best.

Finding pockets of time to connect and bless your kids takes a perspective shift. I was grateful for that conference that reminded me of this, changing something that was a burdensome task into an opportunity to support and encourage the children God has entrusted to my care.

Feed My Starving Children is a Christian non-profit organization that packs food for children all over the world. It depends totally on donations without any government assistance. Good Samaritan volunteers pack food every second Wednesday from 9:00 to 10:45 a.m. and an

occasional Friday evening.

On our January 10th visit, nine of us packed food. We packed 16 boxes. Each box holds 36 packs and each pack is six meals. So if you do the math, that's 3,456 meals! There are other groups packing at the same time and together we accomplished the following:

> Boxes packed: 161 Meals: 34,776 Kids fed a daily meal for a year: 95 Cost: \$10,085.04


### Sure-Footed


