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Pastor's Page

But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus...." (Matthew 28:5)

Have you ever looked for Jesus...really looked for Jesus? It's perhaps an easy question for the early believers, as they could look for (and find) Jesus on the mountain, on the plain, in the wilderness, in the garden, outside the gate, in the cities, in the villages, in the boat, by the sea, on the sea, in the house, in the synagogues. People who looked for Jesus could find him in any number of different places.

Do you suppose the same could be true today? Where do you look for Jesus?

At daybreak on that first Easter morning, Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James and Joseph went to see the tomb...they went, as the angel said, "looking for Jesus." They knew where he was buried, and they expected Jesus' body to be inside the tomb. The last thing they expected was for an angel to be there, sitting on the rolled-back stone, with Jesus' body gone! After all, how and why wouldn't they find what they were looking for? But the angel tells them that Jesus is going on ahead to Galilee, where they will see him.

Now, we know the rest of the story, as it is told in the Bible, that is. After a few post-resurrection sightings, Mark and Luke report the ascension of Jesus into heaven. And we are assured in Matthew of Jesus' promise that "I am with you always, to the end of the age."

So, what does it mean to look for Jesus after the resurrection story? Where are you looking for Jesus today?

I hope you are looking for (well, not only that...for I hope you are also seeing) the Risen Christ in the places you go and in the people you meet. The Risen Christ is visible wherever you see beloved community being created, wherever you see justice and reconciliation being pursued, wherever you see grace and compassion shared. I hope you've considered the Risen Christ when contemplating the living questions we explored here during Lent: "Who Am I?" or "What Do I Love?" or "What is My Gift to the Family of Earth?" or "How Shall I Live, Knowing I Will Die?" or "Who Are We Together with God?"

I hope you see the Risen Christ here at Good Sam when you come for worship or study or rehearsals or meetings. I hope you see the Risen Christ when working together with others in mission. I hope you see the Risen Christ in those you serve in acts of hospitality. And I hope you see the Risen Christ in yourself.

Here is an excerpt from Saint Teresa of Avila's poem "Christ Has No Body": Christ has no body but yours - No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes with which he looks - Compassion on this world.



As you go looking for the One who is "with us always, to the end of the age," look with such eyes of compassion...and I'm pretty sure you'll see the Risen Christ in those you meet, and they'll see the Risen Christ right back in you. Praise be to God!

News from the UMC

General Conference News

General Conference will be held April 23-May 3 at the Convention Center in Charlotte, North Carolina. General Conference is the only body that can set official policy and speak for The United Methodist Church. It meets every four years, or each quadrennium; and after several pandemic delays, it appears General Conference will now convene as planned.

The Book of Discipline requires between 600 and 1,000 delegates, half laity and half clergy, with the number of delegates from each annual or central conference being determined by membership numbers. Pastor Carol was elected in 2019 to serve as the clergy delegate from Minnesota. Any clergy or layperson in the United Methodist Church may submit legislation. This General Conference has 1,099 valid petitions to make decisions on.

All legislation is assigned to one of thirteen legislative committees. Each delegate is also assigned to one of the legislative committees. Each legislative committee must vote to amend, adopt, reject or refer each item **they've been assigned. This work occurs during** the first week of General Conference.

The second week is when plenary sessions are scheduled. That is when all delegates are together in one room to worship together, as well as debate and vote on all the petitions.

News from the UMC

Key legislation referred to as "The Three Rs" is gaining momentum, including proposals for Regionalization, Revised Social Principles, and the Removal of Anti-LGBTQ Language.

Regionalization - Several groups have worked together to prepare legislation for this. The Worldwide Regionalization legislation proposes the formation of 8 Regional Conferences: Africa, Central & Southern Europe, Congo, Northern Europe, Wester Africa, Germany, Philippines, and United States.

With this plan, each regional conference can create administrative rules and regulations for their area. This allows for contextual decisions based on cultural rules and priorities found in a particular geographic area. Of course, there are some things that cannot change, including the UMC Constitution and Social Principles. Those remain the same across all 8 Regions.

This legislation de-centers the United States while also providing equity across all regions; so there is hope among many delegates for this legislation to pass. Read more about it at https://www.resourceumc.org/en/content/ values-and-purpose-of-worldwideregionalization-legislation

This legislation contains constitutional amendments that will require a ratification process. They will first need a 2/3 majority at General Conference. Then they will be voted on by every annual or central conference worldwide, with 2/3 aggregate vote of all members present and voting required.

The ratification process can be a challenge to get the 2/3 majority necessary for adoption. It also takes between 1-2 years to complete.

Revised Social Principles - The current Social Principles were adopted in 1972. For the Revised Social Principles, the General Board of Church and Society engaged in an 8-year process with worldwide regional consultations involving more than 4,000 people, 11 writing teams made up of people around the world, and an online portal for widespread feedback. \mathbf{A} answer any questions you may have.

Some of the hot spots that will likely see a bit of debate include: 1) the definition of marriage as between "two persons," 2) removal of the incompatibility language, 3) calling for compassionate treatment of women and children within polygamy, which has a greater application in cultures around the world, 4) strengthening women's health relative to abortion, and 5) use of alcohol changing from abstinence to judicious use.

Removal of Anti-LGBTQ Language - Since 1972, a number of changes have been made to the Book of Discipline. Those changes have added the harmful phrase that "homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching," prohibited "self-avowed practicing homosexuals" from being "accepted as candidates, ordained as ministers, or appointed to serve The United Methodist Church," and made it a chargeable offense for ordained ministers to officiate same-gender weddings and for congregations to host them.

There are petitions to remove all of the harmful language as well as each prohibition. While there is widespread support for this in the United States, there are vastly different views and laws on homosexuality around the world, so it could be a challenge to get enough votes to adopt each of these petitions. Nevertheless, there is a growing effort to remove these positions from the Book of Discipline, and clear commitment in the United States toward full inclusion.

A Confusing Journey

Luke 24:24 NIV Then some of our companions went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but [Jesus] they did not see.


This is Luke's first telling of an actual eyewitness account of seeing the risen Lord. It is part of the story which takes place on a road to a nearby town; the travelers are telling of the Easter morning events to a stranger who has joined them along the way (the stranger turns out to be Jesus himself!). Angels have announced the news to some women at the tomb at sunrise, but (according to Luke) no one up till this point in the story has actually seen Jesus alive. The two journeying friends are obviously part of Christ's followers, for they mourn his death, and refer to the others as companions. Furthermore, according to this verse, apparently others besides Peter went to the tomb to check things out for themselves, but each too walked away as Peter did, confused and wondering. No further reports of angelic messengers have been reported. With no body to prepare or honor, and a funeral in question at best, these two also walk away and go home, back to Emmaus from where they started.

Their reaction is not that unusual, is it? Combine despair and lost hope with mystery, confusion, and a lack of proof and we too would probably head back to where we started. People today to whom this amazing story is told for the first time are likely to have the same reaction – it sounds so intriguing, but it is such a confusing mystery. Is it any wonder Pastor Jim Beard (he/him)

that they walk away from the church, to a life that doesn't understand or celebrate the meaning of Easter? Unless we continue to journey with them, will they ever see the risen Jesus? Journeying together we share everything – the sorrows, the confusions, and eventually the witnesses of our faith in our risen Lord. Let us continue to walk together, especially with those who question and are confused by the wonders of Easter.

Prayer: Christ of mystery, we don't always understand. Thank you for journeying with us, even when we are unable to see what is happening right before our very eyes. Whenever we are tempted to walk away from you or each other, please don't let us get far before you come up beside us on our way. We desperately want to understand the Easter mystery, but we obviously need your guidance to have it made clear to us. Forgive our slowness of heart and mind; may your words burn within our hearts as we hear them again. Amen.

The Lorax & Other Eco-Justice Voices



How To Request a Grant from the Outreach Fund

The Board of the Good Samaritan Foundation awarded a grant from The Outreach Fund to the Richard Ormsby School in Baiwalla, Sierra Leone, at their February meeting. Have you ever wondered how such grants come to be? Who can make grant requests and what is the process?

Any member of Good Samaritan can make a request in support of an organization or special project that is consistent with our mission as a Christian community of acceptance and nurturing faith that reaches out to our church, our community, and across the globe.

The place to start a request is the good.org website. Once on the website, select the "GIVE" tab, then select "The Good Samaritan Foundation." Review the information on that page and scroll down to select "Request A Good Samaritan Foundation Grant" to access the online request form. You may need to contact the organization you wish to recommend for some of the information. Recipient organizations are usually happy to provide details of their organization and projects. Complete the online form and select "SEND."

Grants are reviewed by The Foundation Board at their quarterly meetings. Grants are one-time, meaning grants cannot be renewed annually. Grants are usually \$1,000 to \$3,000.

If you need assistance or if you have any questions regarding The Foundation, send an email to this address as well. The next meeting of The Foundation is Thursday, May 16. Grant requests should be made by noon on Monday, May 13. We have \$10,900 remaining to award in 2024. We would love to hear from you!

Thank you for your financial support of Good Samaritan Church. Year-to-date results for the two months ended February 29, 2024 look good, shown in the table below, with a net of \$17,193. Also worth noting - we renegotiated higher interest income rates for funds held at our bank, resulting in enough income for half of a month's mortgage payment over the course of a year. Yay!






furnace and air conditioners. It's a little different than just taking a paper filter and placing it in its slot like you typically would do in your residential unit.

We buy filter media that comes in a large roll. I cut the media to size that fits into the filter screens. I use a pizza cutter-like tool to apply it into the screens' edges.

Most of our equipment takes two filters each. We have a total of 16 filters that get changed on our rooftop HVAC units. Then another 15 filters that get changed in our indoor units. I change them every two to three months to make sure the air quality in the building is always clean.

It is also very important to regularly change your residential HVAC filters because it makes your equipment run more efficiently, makes it easier on the equipment while it is running, and keeps the air quality clean inside your home.
