For those who would claim that grace is a thing only in the New Testament, here is a passage which would challenge that assumption. The pen of Isaiah underscores the unconditional love of God centuries before Christ walked the earth. Here we hear of a personal God, one who will sacrifice and pay a high price for you. How much? How high a price? Answer: absolutely everything! You are worth the world to God, the whole of creation even! That's how much you matter to the one who created you, redeemed you, rescued you, and cares for you! If words alone aren't enough to convince you, consider the saving grace of God from the beginning of time (or turn to the back half of the Holy Bible and watch what God does through Jesus Christ for you!).

I once assisted on a week-long youth retreat at a United Methodist camp. One of the evenings involved several stations wherein God's unconditional love was brought to life for the campers. My station was waist-deep in the middle of a serene lake. I was to remind these young disciples of their baptism, which was most likely performed when they were infants. In this beautiful sacrament, we celebrate the love of God for the one being baptized, with life-giving waters pouring



forth. I invited each to come out into the lake one at a time and to consider how much water they need – a cup? A gallon? A barrel? "Now look out across this lake," they were instructed, "and consider that this is how much love God has ready to pour upon you! Better yet, instead of a lake, imagine that you are looking out at an ocean of love which reaches as far as your eyes can see – that's how much love God has for you, and even more!" The imagery brought many to tears; it should do the same for each of us as well.

Loving God, your love for us is overwhelming! In a world of conditions, judgments, and criticisms, we find your unconditional love so difficult to truly believe. Open our hearts, minds, imaginations, and souls to fully receive and appreciate what this means. No matter what, you would give the world for us ... for me! May the waters of my tears be signs of my acceptance and gratitude to you. Amen.



Making a Family Vision Board for the Year Ahead A family vision board is a fun and faith-filled way to reflect on your hopes and dreams for the year ahead. It invites every family member to think about what they want to prioritize, celebrate, or pray for in the coming months. Here's how to create one together:

1) Gather Materials and Reflect

Choose a relaxed time (New Year's Eve? Valentine's Day?) and gather supplies like poster board, magazines, scissors, glue, and markers. Begin with a simple prayer, asking for

God's guidance as you dream together: "God, help us as we create a family vision board for the next year. Thank you for this time, Amen."

Choose a guiding question to get you started, such as, "What do we hope for as a family in 2025?" "How can we grow in love and kindness together?" "What would we like to pray for?"

2) Make the Board

Cut out images, words, and/or phrases that represent your hopes and prayers. Write or color them on the board. You can either make the collage all together as a family or divide the board up with each section given to a member of the family for their own ideas about the family vision. Remember: this vision is for the whole family. It's not a personal vision board.

3) Bless the Intentions

Have each person write their name or initials in the corner. Take a look at it together, asking each person to explain their portion of the board. Bless the board by saying something like, "Thank you, God, for giving us a vision for what our family life will be like this year. Help us to live into our family vision with peace, hope, love, and joy!"

4) Hang it Up and Look at it! Hang up your board in a family space and remember to refer to it often!

As you look forward to a New Year, enjoy your time of creating vision together. Try not to get too caught up on making the board perfect or having to do it just at the beginning of the year. A vision board can happen any time of year.


