Dear Siblings in Christ,

Our Lenten Season is right around the corner. Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word for "lengthen", referring to the gradual increase of daylight that happens during these six weeks that lead up to Holy Week. Each year Lent and Holy Week shift a bit on our calendar. Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox.



This year Ash Wednesday is on March 5. We will gather for worship at 7:00 p.m. You'll have the opportunity to write down something that you want to release for the Lenten season that will be safely burned. This is a confidential prayer between you and God. We remember our mortality as we receive the sign of the cross on our forehead or hand. We'll also celebrate Communion as we begin the Lenten season together.

Our Lenten/Holy Week theme is "Wandering Hearts" from the Sanctified Art series based on the life of the disciple Peter. Each week features a theme phrase from the beloved hymn "Come Thou Fount of Many Blessings".



The remainder of our Holy Week schedule will be:

- Maundy Thursday, April 17 @ 7:00 p.m. with Communion
- Good Friday, April 18 Online Service (posting schedule published in the March newsletter)
- Easter Morning, April 19 @ 10:00 a.m.* Celebration with brass and Chancel Choir
- *Please note this year that there will be one service at 10:00 a.m. rather than an 8:30 a.m. option as in previous years.

I look forward to a vibrant Lent and Holy Week with you all.

The view must have been spectacular: from the mountains, to the prairies, to the oceans white with foam...! More so, Moses stands on the apex of time, the high point of history: generations of faithfulness stretch out behind him to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, while generations of faithfulness stretch out before him to David, Jesus, and even to us. The Lord has indeed been faithful to those like Moses who can see it. The Lord will be with God's people as the generations move forward.

God promised the Ancient Israelites a land flowing with milk and honey, so why can't this new land deal be theirs right now? Their children are surely going to receive it, but it is right there - why must they continue to wait? Obviously, God's timing is beyond their timing.

I wonder if our culture of instant gratification is patient enough for the work of God. Many im-

patient people demand change NOW or they give up in disgust. Many try to set deadlines into God's schedule, but it just doesn't work that way. If your prayers seem to have gone unanswered, if the last promotion seems to have passed you by, if things haven't transpired in the timing you were expecting, maybe God isn't ignoring you or saying, "No" to your wishes; maybe God's response is simply, "Not yet." Take a breath and remain faithful, knowing that all is indeed in God's time.

Omnipotent Lord, grant that I too may be like Moses – with eyes to see and yet with enough patience to accept my place in your timeline of holy history. Grant me the acceptance to trust whatever your timing might be, and to rest assured that all is under your control. Amen.



With discussions like these taking place, small groups of 8-10 people will be better than large groups. So, start now looking for a couple of trusted friends with whom you might feel safe sharing your honest journey ... might it be a Senior Women's Group, a Men's Group, a Couples Group, a Homebound Group, a Young Families Group, a Zoom Group, or a New-to-Good-Sam-Group? Don't know who to ask? No worries! We can help. There will likely be 3-5 separate groups meeting at different times over the 6-week period (Lent runs from Ash Wednesday, March 5, to Easter Sunday, April 20). A trained facilitator will be assigned to each group. Timing is flexible, as is location. All of this will take a bit of coordinating; therefore, registration will take place a bit earlier than usual. Go to tinyurl.com/GSThePath for further information and to get started. All groups will hopefully be set by Sunday, February 23.

This has been one of Pastor Jim's best-received Spiritual Formation courses in the past; it is hoped that it will be just as impactful for you!




Exploring Membership

And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity. - Colossians 3:14



Here are three ideas and tips to make your Valentine's Day service activity a success:

- Keep it simple: A family service project doesn't have to affect a lot of people.
- Involve children/youth in the planning: Say "I was thinking we'd do something kind for our neighbors this Valentine's Day. Here are three ideas, which do you like the best?"
- Reflect afterwards: Take a moment to debrief after your service activity. Ask "How did it feel to share God's love in service?" or "What did you like most about today?"



Finance Team

A Good Year

Financially, we had a good 2024. We finished the end of the year with welcome donations. Thank you to everyone for your continued financial support.

For those who have not yet done so, please send your pledges for support in 2025. We will NOT be rolling over 2024 pledges into 2025 as **we have historically done, so if you haven't** turned in a 2025 pledge card, your pledge will not be entered. Pledge cards are available on the Welcome Table in the Narthex or by the Church Office. Pledges can also be made online at good.org/give/make-a-pledge.

Year-end Income without reserves came in slightly ahead of expectations. Expenses were below expectations, with about \$15,000 (30%) lower than expected costs for Building Gas & Electric – in part due to last year's mild winter. Church Programs for Children, Youth and Adults were about \$4.500 under budget. Our staff is our largest cost area at 53% of our 2024 budget and came in as budgeted. We are grateful for the leadership and support they continue to provide us.

With lower-than-expected costs, we were able to contribute \$2,207 to the Church's Reserve Fund, compared to a budgeted draw on the Reserve of \$15,031. That is great news.



Many thanks to the Office staff for their continued capable attention to our finances. Timely visibility for Income and Expenses enables review and perspective of the programs, leadership, facilities and community that make up Good Samaritan.

We would welcome additional members to our Finance Committee where interesting reviews and discussions of how we are doing take place. Prioritizing budgets and monitoring Church finances is a satisfying way to support our Church. If you are interested, or know someone who might be, please let Byron Olson or Mac Lewis know. We have a great team.
