Holy Week is an excellent time to invite friends and family to worship with us as people may be looking for a place to experience the depth and hope of Holy Week.



Our Lenten Theme

Reaching Our Community

We all believe that Good Samaritan has a terrific message to offer others. From our Beliefs statements to all the "Good" we do with neighbors near and far, we know we have a message and Church unique for our times. However, getting our message out to others is time-consuming and difficult. In 2023, Good Samaritans who attended the Leadership Institute at Church of the Resurrection in Leawood, Kansas, were introduced to a company helping churches get their message out. That organization is "Reach the Lost." In July 2024, Good Samaritan contracted with Reach the Lost to help us.

We contracted with them to improve search engine optimization with the Google search engine (making sure Good Sam is displayed early in the results when people search for a Church). Google also has a program with charitable organizations where they will provide \$300 of free Google ads if the organization meets certain requirements. Good Samaritan met those requirements and we have been utilizing the free Google Ad Grants.



So how have we done? Has the expenditure been money well spent? Three weeks ago, we had a Zoom meeting with the members of Reach the Lost and the results are encouraging. They reported that 45% of our website traffic was due to our free Google Ad Grants. We have used \$12,000 in free ads on Google. 112,000 people saw Good Samaritan ads online. 4,370 people clicked through our Google Ad Grant. And 835 people took the next steps after finding us online. Over 3,000 people saw our Christmas Eve ads.

Good Samaritan has a goal of reaching people who have been hurt by the institutional church by creating an environment that is loving and accepting of all people. 450 people have found us when searching for mental health topics.

What is in the future? We are considering retargeting our Google ads to YouTube, where 77% of Gen Zers use YouTube. We all want change to come quicker but this is a process and it does take time. It is still true that the best way to get new people to attend Good Samaritan is for each of us to invite a friend, acquaintance, or relative to worship on Sunday. Dead or Alive?

I'm telling you these things while I'm still living with you. The Friend, the Holy Spirit whom the Father will send at my request, will make everything plain to you. He will remind you of all the things I have told you. I'm leaving you well and whole. That's my parting gift to you. Peace. I don't leave you the way you're used to being left—feeling abandoned, bereft. So don't be upset. Don't be distraught. ~ John 14:25-27 MSG

Since the children are made of flesh and blood, it's logical that the Savior took on flesh and blood in order to rescue them by his death. By embracing death, taking it into himself, he destroyed the Devil's hold on death and freed all who cower through life, scared to death of death. ~ Hebrews 2:14-15 MSG

It is several weeks before the Passover. Jesus is talking to his disciples, and he gives them the news that he is going to die soon. But he doesn't want them to be sad or depressed or scared; he wants them to feel at peace about this. Years later, the writer of Hebrews reminds us all of Jesus' ultimate purpose – He came to rescue all of humanity. "Rescue us from what?" you may ask. The answer ... from our fear of death, of course.

For many, the fear of dying is still alive and well today. Although we were created in order that we might have life and have it abundantly (cf John 10:10), our fear of death can destroy much of that abundant life. But what if you knew, really knew, that death was not your ultimate end, nor the end for those you love?

What if you knew, deep down in the depths of your being, that dying on this earth wasn't your ultimate destiny? What if you knew this truth, and wanted everyone else to know this truth as well, so they could get on with living life to its fullest, as it was intended to be lived? The best way to convince your loved ones of this would be to not only say it, but to show it, prove it, do it. Make it real, even just once, so that all whom you love could stop being scared to death of dying. Wait a second... isn't this what Jesus did?! He died, and then proved that death wasn't the end. God even has death under control, so there is nothing to fear. Isn't this the truth we need to know?!

Eternal Lord, I pray that this truth goes to the depth of my being and casts out whatever fears are lingering there. I pray that death no longer ruins how I approach life. I pray for this truth to free all those whom I love so that they too may live with ultimate joy and peace and abundance. Thank you, Lord, for proving once and for all that death is not the end, nor to be feared. Perhaps now I can live like I was made to live! Amen.

Visio Divina - Praying with Pictures

A spiritual practice you might like to try out with your family is *Visio Divina*. This practice uses images, photos or works of art to connect with God in a deeper way.

First, look at an image. You can use one from this article or find one that speaks to your family. What stands out to you? What are the details of the image? What is the image saying to you? Ask your child what story is being told in the image.

Second, we meditate on the image. What connections can we make to the story in the image and our lives? Can we imagine our family in this story? For older kids, what might the colors and symbols mean in the artwork?

Next, let's pray about what is happening in this image. For example, from *Christ: The Mother Hen*, "Thank you God for gathering me and my family into your safe and loving hug. You protect us and keep us safe."

Finally, leave some time at the end of your prayer to think deeply about what God is teaching us with this image and our prayer.

Sometimes we think this kind of exercise is above our children's understanding, but it is absolutely within their ability to observe, think, speculate, ponder and wonder about art and our connection to God! While this can be somber, it does not need to be. In fact, art and prayer are meant to bring joy, peace and connection to the Divine!

Consider Planned Giving



The Board of Directors of The Good Samaritan Foundation met for their first quarter meeting on February 20. At that meeting the financials of the three Foundation funds were reviewed. The 2025 five percent draw amount for The Outreach Fund was set at \$14,700 and at \$17,500 for The Evergreen Fund. The Board also reviewed a grant request by Oasis for

Youth and awarded \$3,500 in support of their programs serving youth and young adults ages 16 to 24 in the Bloomington, Edina, and Richfield areas.

The importance of planned giving was discussed as the most transformational way to give to The Foundation. Typically, this involves donors making gifts to any of the three funds of The Foundation through their financial or estate plans. The various forms of giving are through bequests in wills, trusts, or designated beneficiaries on life insurance policies or assets such as stocks or bonds. Most gifts are realized after the donor's death so as not to draw on their daily cash flow needs. These gifts are responsibly invested for long-term gain.

The benefits to the donor include the joy of giving back to Good Samaritan and upholding the ministries that impact our church and community, knowing that their gift ensures that Good Samaritan receives financial support beyond their lifetime, and tax advantages that may reduce estate taxes and other tax liabilities.

The planned giving process can open the door for discussions that encourage you to approach end-of-life plans positively and productively. Seek guidance from estate planning attorneys and/ or financial advisors to choose a plan that best fits your wishes. Finance Update

Paying pledges and other contributions early or evenly throughout the year helps Good Samaritan's finances be at or favorable to our budget plan. February revenue of \$42,617 is \$9,060 below plan. This is reflected in the YTD revenue of \$162,599 to be \$9,895 below plan. February Net Income is (\$12,656) compared to plan of (\$4,357) for a variance of (\$8,299). This brings YTD Net Income to \$47,226 a positive number, but \$13,625 below plan. The table below reflects our financial status through the end of January. ~ Kent Holmes

Maintenance Minute: Keeping Good Samaritan Safe

Happy spring everyone! I hope I don't jinx myself by saying that in the middle of March as sometimes it snows in April.

Between the end of February and

the beginning of May, Good Sam has many mandatory life safety equipment inspections that take place. Only qualified technicians can perform these inspections on certain equipment. This includes the hood suppression system in the kitchen, and our fire panel which includes all fire alarms, strobes, smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. We also have a company come to inspect our fire sprinkler system. They inspect the sprinkler heads for any leaks and test the water pressure in the pipes. These inspections need to be done yearly and after they are done everything is submitted to an online compliance engine where the fire department can make sure the

inspections took place. If we are even a couple days

past due inspections the fire department is on top of contacting me to make sure they were either done or scheduled to be done.

I am in charge of inspecting and testing our safety lights and exit signs monthly. These stay lit during a power outage, helping direct folks out of the building. I test these lights by pushing the test button, which cuts power to the light, putting it into battery operation. If the light does not

> stay lit after pushing the test button, the battery is dead and needs to be changed. If the light gets even slightly dimmer when pushing the test

button, it means the battery is starting to go bad, so I will change those at that point as well. I always have these batteries on hand since they do periodically go bad.

I take the safety of everyone that enters Good Sam very seriously! In my opinion it is the most important aspect of my job. I'm confident that if there ever was a power outage or fire in the building, all safety equipment would perform satisfactorily, and everyone would be able to get out in a safe manner.
