The song is a paraphrase of Rabbi Rami Shapiro's translation of Rabbi Tarfon's work on the Pirke Avot 2:20 and a commentary on Micah 6:8.

Do not be daunted by the enormity of the world's grief. Do justly now, love mercy now, walk humbly now, with God/Love. You need not finish the work Neither can you abandon it.

Love in Action

Each year, churches in the Minnesota Annual Conference take a Love Offering for missions in conjunction with our Annual Conference Session. The theme of the 2025 Annual Conference - which will take place June 11-13, 2025 at the St. Cloud Convention Center - is "Created for Love."

Our Love Offering theme this year is "Love in Action." Bishop Lanette Plambeck invites congregations to pray about and participate in the Love Offering as we put love into action. Donations to the 2024 Love Offering totaled \$142,963.40, a 78% increase from the 2023 total! How much will we raise this year?

This year's Love Offering will go to:

- Africa University for student scholarships (30%)
- Immigration Law and Justice Network (30%)
- OC Ministries (20%)
- Midwest Mission (20%)
- We will also collect supplies and kits for Midwest Mission and the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR).

Bedrock Craziness

Now, let me ask you something profound yet troubling. If you became believers because you trusted the proclamation that Christ is alive, risen from the dead, how can you let people say that there is no such thing as a resurrection?

If there's no resurrection, there's no living Christ.

~ 1 Corinthians 15:12-13 MSG

Paul asks his young church in Corinth, and us, to look back. We are asked to look inside ourselves to the point when we first became believers. He's saying that we most likely became believers when we first believed that the resurrection story was real. It was this crazy story about a dead man, Jesus, being alive again that probably changed us, that made us have faith, that made us put our hearts and lives in God's hands. Now, he says, how can you let others just say there is no such thing as a resurrection? Don't pass this off as being a trivial issue! If you let them win this point of faith with you, just what are you basing your faith upon?!

It's easy for me to avoid religious arguments with people. I am afraid of losing the debate. I am afraid their logic will win over my less eloquent words, and I will look foolish. Worse yet, I am afraid my beliefs will be shot down as wrong and then what will I have? Maybe I can ignore their points on some issues of faith, and concede some other points to tolerance, but we just cannot brush off the resurrection. Their skepticism does not make their arguments valid. We must hold fast to this foundational idea, even if we do look and sound crazy, even if we don't win the day. Resurrection is the heart of what our faith is truly all about!

God of miracles, Your resurrection act is incredible, and yet I believe it! Help me never to deny it in the face of confrontation. My life is so full because of your crazy love. Your love makes me claim the craziest things, because your love is real, and I know it because of the resurrection! That Easter restoration to life is the bedrock of my faith in you! Amen.

Good Samaritan Adds Organic Recycling

Why: Good Samaritan has always valued being a good steward of our earth. We are now upping our game and including recycling organics Organic into our daily efforts. Food waste is the single most Recycling common material sent to landfills (24% EPA 2023). When food decomposes in a landfill, it traps heat and creates methane gas. Food waste is responsible for 58% of landfill methane emissions (EPA Landfill Emissions from Land filled Food Waste 2025), contributing to global warming

(UN Environment Program 2022).

How: We are able to bring organic recycling to Good Samaritan at no cost to our church by securing grants for over \$2,000: from the state of Minnesota for bins, signage, and bags from the city of Edina for weekly organics pickup for six months. Then a new comprehensive recycling company will begin organic waste collection at a savings over our current nonorganics hauler.

Who: Good Samaritans can help by learning which organic or compostable items are recyclable and how to dispose of them. In fact, **the children attending Creekside Children's** Place at Good Samaritan will begin lessons on recycling daily food waste and compostables with this program, teaching our youngest how to be good stewards of the earth they will inherit.

When: The Organic Recycling coordinator for Edina will conduct an in-person presentation at church of how to identify and easily recycle food wastes and compostables. This will be scheduled after the bins are delivered and we can start organic recycling, in late spring or early summer.

Learning to Forgive






• It names the wrong. A real apology acknowledges the wrong, specifically, not a general, "I'm sorry."


- It does not blame the other person. It names the behavior you exhibited, not the cause of your response.
- It offers a way of repair. For example: "I am sorry I yelled, that was not fair." "I will try to remember to breathe when I start to get frustrated."

How to accept an apology. Saying "it's okay" or "It's fine" is really not true. Instead, "I appreciate your apology." "Your apology means a lot to me." "I hear you." "It will be okay, I accept your apology."

Kids need to see good examples of apologies and acceptances. As their grown-ups, we need to model them and help them learn to do both.

What Have We Been Doing?

In April, Good Samaritans continued to tackle food insecurity with not just two, but three Feed My Starting Children food packing events, delivering Meals on Wheels and a very successful Minnesota Food Share project. YOU donated food and then packed 32 Express Bags (317 pounds of food) to support VEAP Food Shelf, and the extra food that didn't fit in those bags was donated to Joyce Uptown Food Shelf. There were also money donations for the food shelves that allowed us to donate \$1,500 to each shelf in addition to the food. THANK YOU!!

We continued to focus on housing insecurity by attending the Rent is Due online Zoom meeting with Beacon Interfaith Housing and following through with emails to key legislators in support of their efforts on supportive housing.

Several Good Samaritan folks attended the Minnesota Reconciling Congregations' Annual Spring Gathering at Eden Prairie UMC where they learned about Regionalization and other Constitutional Amendments coming before the Annual Conference in June and their impact on inclusion.

What if ...

What if Church educated and fed 500 children in Baiwalla, Sierra Leone. Would you be a part?

Judith Gaima had a dream. She dreamt that one day she would return to her home village of Baiwalla and start a school for the children of her village. She has done that and so much more. Judith spent 18 years in



the United States graduating from Divinity School and becoming an ordained elder in the United Methodist Denomination. At last, in 2019, she opened that school in Baiwalla with 124 7th through 12th grade students. It is the Richard Ormsby School. She continually added grades, and now the school has 500 students in grades 1-12!

You may remember Rev. Gaima – she spoke at Good Samaritan in 2024. She has done more than establish a school. She has started two United Methodist congregations. She started a farm to help feed the children. She started a store to sell excess produce and supplies to help the school. She

"I have been seeing myself as an early dropout of school because of family finances, but with your support, I am confident I can complete school." started a girls' dormitory because of fear for the safety of the female students going to and from the school every day. She started a canteen as a meeting place for the villagers. She feeds the students every school day. We call her Judith of Baiwalla!

Minnesota United Methodists have been instrumental in the success of the Ormsby School. The average wage in Baiwalla is \$2.00 per day. The cost to educate, feed and house the stu-

dents is far in excess of what the parents can afford. That is where Good Samaritans come in. So how much does all this cost?

- Sponsor a student for a year: \$620
- Sponsor lunch for one student: \$300 per year
- Sponsor a teacher for a year: \$1500 \$2500
- But any amount is appreciated!
