# Aldersgate History

## The Aldersgate United Methodist Church Story

Aldersgate began its humble beginnings in 1946 as a merger of Brookside Community Church, begun about 1913 on Brookdale Avenue in St. Louis Park, and the Methodist (Episcopal) Meeting House on Brownlow Avenue in St. Louis Park established in the 1920s. The combined congregation took the name of Aldersgate, in honor of John Wesley's remembrance of feeling his heart "strangely warmed" as he attended a meeting of a little church on Aldersgate Street in London. In 1949, part of the Baston farm was purchased for \$6,500 for a new church. The location was halfway between the two merging churches. The Groundbreaking Ceremonies were held on April 30, 1950. The new church, at 3801 Wooddale Avenue S, was dedicated on September 30, 1951. The Aldersgate building, intended for a capacity of 375 Sunday worshippers (250 as of ground breaking in 1950, plus any expected growth for the next 25 years), soon found itself too small to accommodate the growing population of St. Louis Park and its membership.

Eventually, through several years and additions to the building and remodels, by 1959 the church held three worship services on Sunday mornings. In 1961, it had over 1,000 children in its Sunday School program, meeting in three shifts - one on Saturday and two on Sunday. Life at Aldersgate was full and faithful, steeped in love of God, and love of and service to the community.

In 1971, the sanctuary was remodeled with new stained-glass windows throughout. The design was very bold and extended beyond the frames of the window, creating a feeling of a fourth dimension in space. The windows had a childlike quality, with strong, colored shapes that could be viewed from any vantage point and removed all traces of reality. Two of the stained glass windows have been moved to our new home at Good Samaritan.

As our church grew, library was added and staffed by three librarians. Five handbell choirs - a new way to worship pioneered at Aldersgate - were added. One particularly for teens to allow for musical participation during a time of uncertain voice changes! In addition, we had: vocal choirs for all ages, youth outreach through local and national service projects, adult outreach through local



meetings and service projects assisting with homeless and domestic abuse needs, and 30 years of our annual Theater of the Spirit (TOTS) musical theater productions attracting members and non-members alike - all were part of the life of a vibrant church, grounded in the word of God.

But things changed at Aldersgate.

Membership dwindled, and despite many efforts, it seemed that this congregation called Aldersgate found itself with fewer and fewer members and an aging building that needed more and more repairs. The congregation determined to sell the building and to temporarily rent space from Spirit of Christ Lutheran Church in St. Louis Park in order to continue meeting and to continue its mission emphasis of serving others while working to make new disciples for Christ. The time finally came for a more permanent resolution, and the search was on for a place for Aldersgate members to call their new home, someplace to continue their mission with like-minded people who also loved God and neighbor, a place to belong, to believe, to become.

That search led to the nearby congregation of Good Samaritan United Methodist Church in Edina, and after visitation in each other's worship services and careful and prayerful discernment, it was agreed by both congregations to merge into one, keeping the "Good Sam" name, while still remembering, honoring, and celebrating the history and people who make up Aldersgate. And here we are!

## Happy Birthday, Betty!

Betty Fuller, from Aldersgate UMC, is celebrating her 104th birthday, and 100 years of worshiping at Aldersgate!

Betty Fuller was born on January 3, 1922. Her family moved to St. Louis Park when Betty was four years old, and her parents joined the church that became Aldersgate. Betty's mother, Mary Ludwig, was the church organist, and Betty's father, Edward, was the architect for three church additions. Mary suggested the name Aldersgate for the new church building.

Betty married Ralph Fuller in 1947. They raised four children and have six grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. Ralph passed away in December 2009.

Betty has always loved adventure. For many years, her family gave her thrill-seeking gifts for her birthday.

At age 88, Betty did a sky jump from the Strat Tower in Las Vegas.

At age 89, she went skydiving.

At age 91, she rode in a glider plane.

At age 93, she rode the Timber Twister in Duluth – 4 times!

At age 94, she went zip-lining.

At age 96, she went hang gliding.

At age 98, she went indoor skydiving.

Three of those adventures resulted in her appearance on local TV news.

Betty drove until she was 95. At her assisted living residence, she continues to lead a sitting exercise class, and play bingo and Wii bowling.

At Aldersgate, Betty sang in the choir and rang in the Jubilee! Bell Choir until she was 98. She knitted prayer shawls until she was 102. And in church you will always find her in the front row.

## More Than Royalty

The moment Jesus came up out of the baptismal waters, the skies opened up and he saw God's Spirit – it looked like a dove – descending and landing on him. And along with the Spirit, a voice: "This is my Son, chosen and marked by my love, delight of my life."

Matthew 3:16-17 MSG

In the first two chapters of his gospel, Matthew establishes that Jesus is a king. He now goes on to prove the fact that Jesus is more than human royalty; this one is the Son of God, heir of the Divine ruler, and divine in nature as well. This God-man comes with his own personal herald, who announces his coming. The ritual of baptism marks his spiritual blessings, and God himself makes an appearance to proclaim the special relationship between them.

A grand testing conducted by the devil himself then takes place in the wilderness, a testing which confirms and establishes Jesus's spiritual loyalty and character, followed by crowds gathering rapidly from all corners of the Holy Lands, and miraculous healings taking place. Matthew is about to go into an extensive set of teachings which have come to be known as the Beatitudes, but before trying to teach or direct anything, Matthew firmly establishes that Jesus has the authority to do so. Jesus is king; Jesus is God; Jesus is to be listened to and obeyed.

To whom do we listen and obey? So many times, we listen to the voices of people who are not royal nor Godly. So many times, we obey those who play on our needs for food, safety, or power as the devil tried to do with Jesus in the wilderness. We are lost in our multiple-choice society; we need to know that there is indeed a leader in whom we can trust, a God in whom we can believe. What would life be like if we stopped running around trying to fix our brokenness with superficial solutions from the

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multiple voices in our heads? What miracles of freedom might we experience today if we listened only to the one true voice of authority, and then obeyed His teachings and directives? So many times, we don't give Jesus the authority over our lives that he deserves. Matthew wants us to know who we can trust: His name is Jesus! He is our king and more than that, he is our God! So listen to him!

*Almighty Lord, I am sorry that I hold back from giving you authority over my soul. You are faithful and true and never let go. Help my lack of devotion to be replaced by a steadfast trust in you. Take this soul that is drowning in the voices of temptation and let it overflow with trust in you. Amen .*

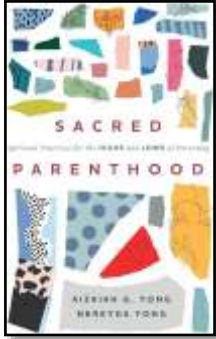

# Missions

## What Have We Been Doing?

**Food Security: Feed My Starving Children** – On a snowy day in December, Good Samaritans joined others who braved the cold to form a group of 125 folks who packed 194 boxes of food that translates to 41,904 meals - enough to feed 114 children a daily meal for a year. And Good Samaritan drivers delivered meals for Edina Meals on Wheels.

**Housing:** We continue to advocate with Beacon Interfaith Housing. In December, the focus shifted to the Minnesota State Legislature to keep funds previously allocated for supportive housing intact and delivered to those who can best utilize those funds.

**Refuge support:** We have been assisting two families with students at Stonebridge School. We continue to support the family from Ecuador with material needs and occasional rides. Recently, the father of another student was picked up and deported by ICE. The family, a young mother with a 3<sup>rd</sup> grader and a newborn, wishes to join him in Guatemala. Members have supplied clothes and suitcases and are intending to help with airfare. Prayers for these families as they navigate uncertain futures.

**STEP Toys** – a full carload was delivered to STEP (St. Louis Park Emergency Program) for their Toy Distribution Program, along with a very full envelope of gift cards. Thanks to all who brought these items to the Hanging of the Greens!

## Food Security Highlight:

### Where Do Food Shelves Get Their Food?

Good Samaritan has been supporting two local food shelves: VEAP and Joyce Uptown Food Shelf. With our merger, we will be expanding to support STEP, which primarily serves St. Louis Park, as well. VEAP serves Bloomington, Richfield, South Minneapolis, and Edina, and Joyce primarily serves the Uptown area of Minneapolis. They all will serve anyone who comes to them in need.

Most food is purchased from Second Harvest



Heartland. Through their buying power and purchases from the government, a dollar goes much further than what we can purchase. But other sources of food are equally important. They add variety and choices, reflect regionally or culturally appropriate foods, and reduce food waste. It also helps build relationships with the communities they serve.

Food drives by churches and other organizations are one way to collect food, but there are other creative ways for food shelves to get food locally.



Joyce takes a van around to 10 local grocery stores each week and collects their 'near expiration date' produce and packaged foods. This has

no small impact. Of the nearly 1 million pounds of food they distributed in 2024, over 106,000 lbs. – more than 10% - came from this food recovery program. VEAP has started a similar program collecting food from their local grocery stores.

The Richfield Garden group grows produce in their backyards every year and donates it to VEAP – and this has grown to a significant program! The food shelves have also worked with



local farm groups to purchase directly from them, again, improving freshness and variety and reducing food that might have gone to waste.

Whether food arrives in bulk or through food drives, it all needs to be sorted. Bulk products need to be broken down into usable portions. Items past their dates or spoiled need to be discarded. And everything

Both VEAP and STEP provide other services and so have larger budgets and other revenue sources.

needs to be arranged on shelves for those shopping or bagged for those seeking emergency food bags.

All the food shelves rely heavily on volunteers to do this sorting and other work. Hundreds of hours of volunteer time every week make this all possible. VEAP's 2024 report noted that their volunteer hours that year equaled having over 33 full-time paid staff positions. Joyce is able to operate with only three paid staff positions thanks to their 200-plus volunteers.

## STONEBRIDGE World School



Stonebridge School and Good Samaritan Volunteers Have Been Busy!

Stonebridge World School is a tuition-free Preschool – 6th grade Minneapolis charter school that provides a unique combination of global curriculum, a variety of services, and a central location designed to provide a first-class education to Minneapolis students. Good Samaritan has had a long history with the school and staffs the school's library with volunteers. They have been actively engaged in several projects aimed at enhancing student learning and fostering a love for reading. The school has a grant from the State of Minnesota to fund these efforts to encourage children to read more.

The dedicated volunteer librarians - Martha Kouatli, Leigh Hamersten, and JoAnn Knutson - have been working diligently to scan 6,000 books into a new digital system. This system will store book information and checkout names securely in the Cloud. With only 1,000 to 2,000 books left to scan, the new system will be rolled out for students after Christmas break.

### Volunteer Opportunities

To support the library, Stonebridge is seeking volunteers to help one afternoon each week - Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday. Volunteers will guide students in finding books that match their interests, and training will be provided. Additionally, the school is looking for morning reading tutors to assist students as they read, helping them with unfamiliar words. All reading materials will be supplied. The goal is to recruit eight assistants or tutors, with two scheduled each day for approximately two hours, as well as some substitute volunteers. Note that the library is closed to students on Mondays.

### Expanding Access to Books

The school has begun receiving book donations and will purchase additional books to strengthen areas of need within the school library. Current priorities for new books include Graphic Novels such as *Dog Man* and *Cat Kid*, books about Native Americans, and kids' cookbooks, which are particularly popular. The library also needs books about lesser-known American holidays, including Mother's Day, Father's Day, Flag Day, Memorial Day, and Indigenous Peoples' Day. Students also enjoy older copies of the Guinness Book of Records, National Geographic's *Weird But True*, *Ripley's Believe it or Not*, and *Scholastic World Records, Lists, or Almanacs*.

We are also helping teachers in establishing Little Free Libraries in students' neighborhoods, and donated books are being supplied to stock these resources. In addition, plans are underway to organize field trips for students and parents to visit the downtown library and encourage regular library use.
